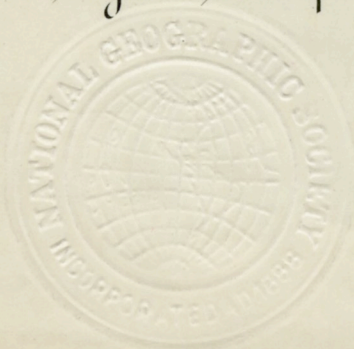

Among your privileges as a member will be your right to receive, without additional charge, The Society's monthly, the National Geographic Magazine.


